THE ARENA

My mom used to say, "Find the student who seems alone and be kind to them." That simple truth shaped everything I am. Even as a kid, I was drawn to those on the outside—students who were new, different, or struggling. Reaching out felt right. But it also made me a target.

I remember sitting with a boy at lunch who was having a hard time. By that afternoon, a rumor had spread that I had the same "cooties" the school had unfairly assigned to him. I hadn't done anything wrong. But the feeling of being judged and misunderstood for choosing kindness—it stuck with me.

I didn't know it then, but I was learning a lesson I'd carry for life: when you stand beside someone—or something—that others don't understand, you often become a target too. But you stand anyway.

The boy at the lunch table? **Today, he is school choice**—more specifically, non-classroom-based charter schools. He represents parents seeking something different and students thriving beyond traditional structures. And just like back then, there are still people who would rather dismiss what they don't understand than pause long enough to ask, "What if this is exactly what's needed?"

I stepped into the arena of public education not to reject the system but to reimagine it. I mortgaged my home to help launch Elite Academic Academy because I believed—and still believe—that students and educators deserve more than what outdated systems can provide. We didn't build Elite to take down anything. We built it to create something better. Elite is legally compliant, fully transparent, and student-centered. It's not a loophole. It's a lifeline. We created a model that personalizes learning, honors teachers, and supports growth.

Our year-round program offers every student a 175-day seat and has helped hundreds of high schoolers—many from under-privileged communities—graduate, catch up, or accelerate. We've seen meaningful academic gains even with students who enroll midyear. Those results don't happen by accident; they happen because of vision, care, and relentless follow-through.

That includes how we support our team. I believe paying people well is not something to explain—it's something to model. Every salary at Elite—whether for an administrator, teacher, or staff member—is approved by our Board and publicly available. When you build a culture where people feel trusted and valued, they stay. And most importantly, they thrive.

That's why Elite has a 98% teacher retention rate. That's not luck, that's leadership.

Our operational backbone is just as strong. Our back office—led by a CEO who would be the envy of any organization—has delivered clean audits and unqualified opinions year after year. That kind of operational excellence makes everything else possible.

Still, as with anything meaningful, there's been noise. Recently, a single article tried to reshape our story. It was based on two former employees who voiced no concerns at the time and written by a reporter with a long record of anti-charter bias. The piece cast shadows instead of light.

Here's the hard truth: when people choose not to understand something, they try to connect dots that simply aren't there. That's how legally compliant, transparent schools like Elite get wrongly compared to fraudulent individuals who were prosecuted for criminal behavior. It's not just inaccurate—it's reckless and irresponsible. It ignores the work, the outcomes, and the families we serve every day.

However, that's the arena. When you dare to do things differently, not everyone will understand. Some will skip over outcomes and overlook integrity to feed a narrative that fits easier into fear than facts.

And yet, our facts are strong. Elite's Mountain Empire Charter was named a California Distinguished School. We earned a six-year WASC accreditation and are proudly certified as a Marzano High Reliability School at Levels 1 and 2 for both schools. These are not just titles—they are validation that the model works and the mission is real.

So yes, the arena can be loud and you may experience attacks. But I've learned you don't need to silence the critics; you just need to stay rooted in your purpose. Mine is solid and student-centered.

THE ARENA

Now, I'm stepping into a new arena—one that's been in motion for over a year and planned well before recent weeks. While the timing may invite questions, this shift is not a reaction. It's a calling. I've been given the opportunity to bring this work to a broader stage—to reimagine education and leadership at a global level. I'm not leaving the arena; I'm expanding it.

And Elite is ready too.

This model was never built around one person. A new leader has stepped into the arena—someone deeply aligned with the mission and uniquely placed to carry it forward. The foundation remains strong. The team is visionary and the heartbeat of Elite will continue to echo through each student whose life is being shaped by this work.

I am proud.

Proud of the families who trusted us.

Proud of the students who found their confidence here.

Proud of the educators who stayed, innovated, and grew.

Proud of the leaders still in the arena, doing this work with heart.

And to the other leaders in the non-classroom-based space: stay strong. Your turn in the arena may come, if it hasn't already. The arena can be merciless. The spotlight is not always kind. But the work is worth it. The students are worth it. The only path through the noise is with truth, transparency, and tenacity.

I'm proud of myself—for listening to that voice that's been with me since I was a little girl at that lunch table:

Find the one who see<mark>ms alone.</mark>

Be kind.

Stand with them.

Even when it's hard. Especially when it's hard.

Because that's where real change begins. And that's where you'll always find me. "It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better.

The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly... who errs, who comes short again and again... because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat."

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER (CEO)

Elite Academic Academy – Lucerne

This agreement is entered into between the Board of Trustees, Elite Academic Academy Charter School – Lucerne (EAAL) and Chief Executive Officer ("CEO"). Ms. Ashlea Kirkland shall serve as Chief Executive Officer and Secretary to the Board pursuant to Education Code 35035.

<u>I.</u> Term of Contract

The term of the Agreement for Ms. Kirkland to serve as CEO will be from July 1st, 2025, through June 30th, 2027, subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

On or before March 15th of each year, the Agreement shall automatically be extended for an additional year unless either the Board or the CEO provides contrary written notice to the other by March 15th of that concluding contract year.

II. Compensation

The CEO's salary for the 2025-2026 school year is \$125,000. In addition, Ms. Kirkland will receive associated STRS retirement compensation in accordance with the annual rates established by STRS. The CEO's salary for subsequent school years subject to this Agreement will be increased as follows:

- Beginning in the 2026-2027 school year, and all subsequent years, the CEO's salary shall be increased by an amount equal to 3%. The CEO reserves the right, at her sole and absolute discretion, to adjust her salary downward (only) or defer her salary in the event EAAL revenue warrants such action(s).
- Beginning July 1, 2025, the CEO shall receive a stipend of \$500 per month for office expenses, travel, and mileage (In lieu of any reimbursement except for provisions under Section VIII - Professional Duties).

III. Duties

The CEO shall perform all duties in accordance with the laws of the State of California and the rules and regulations of the EAAL. All powers and duties legally delegated to the CEO are to be executed in accordance with the policies adopted by the Board.

The CEO shall organize, reorganize, and arrange all staff in a manner, which, in her judgment, best serves the organization. The board will ratify all staffing decisions. Additionally, the CEO will also have direct responsibility over the following areas:

- Program development
- Establishing new charters
- Charter expansion /growth
- Human Resources
- Curriculum & Instruction
- Public Relations
- Daily Operations
- Board Meeting agenda development and board support
- Budget Development / Implementation
- Marketing
- Provide oversight to all associated organizational activities

IV. Sick Leave

The CEO shall accrue sick leave at the rate of one (1) day per month, per contract year. The sick leave may be accumulated without limit.

V. Work Year

The CEO shall render twelve (12) months, 220 days of full and regular service during each annual period covered by this Agreement. The work year is normally exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. The CEO will also receive 25 vacation days per year (2.08/month). The CEO can carry over any unused vacation days and/or be paid her daily rate for associated days. All days will be verified by her work calendar. Upon termination of this agreement, the Chief Executive Officer shall be entitled to compensation for all unused or accrued vacation days.

VI. Benefits and Reimbursements

State Teachers Retirement System (STRS).

The CEO shall be entitled to health, dental, and vision benefits.

In addition, after five years of service, upon her retirement, or disability, the CEO, after reaching the age of 50, shall receive the same medical, dental, and vision benefits as provided. This benefit shall include the CEO and eligible dependents and continue until the CEO is age 65. In the event the CEO shall pass away prior to reaching age 65, the spouse shall receive the benefits until the CEO would have reached 65. All statutes applicable to sick leave, disability leave and retirement for certificated employees shall apply.

VII. Membership Organization Dues

The EAAL shall pay membership fees for the CEO in three professional organizations, and two community-based organizations of her choosing. The Board shall encourage the CEO to participate on professional committees and attend professional conferences.

VIII. Professional Duties

The CEO shall endeavor to maintain and improve her professional competence by all available means, including joining and participating in appropriate local, state, and national professional educational associations and their activities, as well as professional development, workshops, conferences, visitations, and meetings. EAAL shall pay for all reasonable expenses incurred in connection with these activities. The CEO may undertake consultant work in other outside professional activities as long as it doesn't interfere with EAAL. Such days will be charged as non-contract days.

IX. Evaluation

The Board may annually evaluate the performance of the CEO and the working relationship between the CEO and the Board(s). The annual evaluation may be in writing and completed by the first regular Board meeting in December of each year unless the Board and the CEO agree on another date. The Board's failure to complete an evaluation during any school year, its failure to timely complete or its failure to implement an action plan, shall have no legal effect upon the CEO's continuing employment.

X. Dispute Resolution

(a) **Mediation**. CEO and EAAL agree to make a good faith effort to settle any dispute or claim that arises under this Agreement through discussion and negotiations. In the event of a claim or dispute, the CEO or EAAL may request, in a writing to the other party, to refer the claim or dispute to mediation before the initiation of any Formal legal action. The request must be made within thirty (30) days of the claim or dispute first being raised by either party. Upon receipt of a request for mediation, both parties shall make a good faith effort to select a mediator and complete the mediation within sixty (6)0 days of the request for refer the claim or dispute to mediation. The mediator's fee, if any, shall be paid by EAAL. Each party shall bear her/its own attorneys' fees and costs. All persons who attend the mediation shall be bound by the confidentiality requirements of California Evidence Code

sections 1115 et seq.

(b) Binding Arbitration. EAAL and CEO agree that, to the extent any claim or dispute between the parties is not resolved fully through mediation pursuant to Section X(a) hereinabove, such claim or dispute shall be submitted to binding arbitration conducted by Judicial Arbitration and Mediation Service (JAMS) pursuant to its Employment Arbitration Rules and Procedures. EAAL shall pay all fees for JAMS services to the extent required by law.

XI. Retirement or Termination of Contract

This Agreement may be changed or terminated by mutual consent of the parties hereto provided, however, the party seeking such change or termination shall give not less than sixty (60) days written notice to the other party. Any termination without cause will result in payment to the CEO by EAAL in an amount equal to two (2) full years of salary.

CERTIFICATED NOTICE OF EMPLOYMENT

I hereby accept this offer of employment (as outlined in the attached job description) and agree to comply fully with each and every condition thereof, and to fulfill faithfully all of the duties of employment as **Chief Academic Officer** of Elite Academic Academy- Lucerne for the 2025-2027 school years.

The terms of this employment offer are conditioned upon the receipt of proof of legal eligibility to work in the United States (IRS I-9) and successful completion of all background (Livescan) checks.

It is understood that the period of employment will be from July 1, 2025 - June 30, 2027. On or before March 15th of each year, the agreement shall automatically be extended for an additional year unless either the Board or the CEO provides written notice by March 15th of that concluding contract year.

Due to funding uncertainties generally, and more specifically associated with the School's required participation in the SB 740 funding process for non-seat-time charter schools, as well as the unpredictability of legislation affecting charter schools, the total amount of School funds available for employee compensation is often unknown to the School at the outset of any academic year. Accordingly, you will be paid a minimum annual salary of \$214,180 (or \$17,848.33 per month), less applicable withholdings for 232 days of work (see calendar attached) for the 25/26 school year, which amount may be adjusted upward, during or at the conclusion of the academic year, by the School's governing board in its sole discretion. [Note: This includes your salary of \$212,180 (which is a 3% increase from your 24/25 salary, of \$206,000) plus a \$2,000 salary in honor of your doctorate degree, for a total annual salary of \$214,180.] All subsequent years, the Chief Academic Innovations Officer salary shall be increased by an amount equal to 3%.

You will also receive a stipend of \$250 a month for travel and mileage (in lieu of mileage reimbursement), which should adequately cover any travel and mileage expenses you incur in the performance of your duties.

You will be paid once a month on, or before, the 26th of each month. Salary increases and annual bonuses may be awarded at the end of each calendar year, at the sole and absolute discretion of the CEO, based upon, among other things, your performance and the School's

overall performance during the calendar year.

You will be eligible for all benefits as generally offered to similarly situated employees of the School, including contributions to California State Teachers Retirement System, as further described in our Employee Handbook. The School also offers Health and Welfare benefits, after one month of employment, totaling \$10,800 a year (or \$900 a month), which can be used to purchase medical, dental, and vision insurance benefits offered through the Charter providers. You may "opt out" of medical insurance provided by the Charter and retain a monthly allotment of \$200. For more information, please see the plan benefits.

You will accrue 15 vacation days per year (1.25 per month), verified by your work calendar that must be used by the end of the contracted year, with a maximum of a 5-day rollover. With permission of the Chief Executive Officer, you may also cash out your vacation days during the contracted year. The Chief Academic Officer will also accrue sick days (as outlined in the Employee Handbook), and will be awarded 10 additional "non-contract" days, to be used at your request, and upon approval of the CEO, throughout the school year.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement, the Board, at its sole discretion, shall upon giving thirty (30) days' written notice, have the option to terminate this agreement without cause. Within the 30-day notice period, the Chief Academic Officer shall have the opportunity to propose a cure and correction plan to the CEO, and the Board shall have the sole discretion to allow the Chief Academic Officer to implement the cure and correction plan. If the Board elects the option to terminate this agreement, however, it shall pay the Chief Academic Officer in one (1) lump sum payment within one hundred twenty (120) days of giving written notice of termination, an amount equal to the lesser of the salary for a period of three (3) months or the salary for the number of months remaining on the agreement, if such remainder is less than three (3) months. In addition, the health benefits will be maintained by the charter school covering the same length of time or until the Chief Academic Officer finds other employment, whichever is less. The calculation for purposes of the lump sum payment shall not include any payment for vacation that would have been earned following thirty (30) days after the date of the notice of termination. If this agreement is terminated for cause, none of the aforementioned benefits will apply and the employee will forfeit any claims.

It is a condition of your employment that you review our Arbitration Agreement (attached) which provides that any disputes between you and the School be submitted to binding arbitration. You should notify the School in writing of any complaints you have with respect to your employment so that any issues can immediately be addressed and rectified.

It is also a condition of your employment that you sign our Confidentiality and Non-Disclosure Agreement (which you previously signed), which contains additional requirements for the protection of the School's trade secret, confidential and proprietary information as well as an assignment to the School of the ideas, concepts and other intellectual property that you create while you are employed by the School.

Elite Academic Academy - Lucerne further acknowledges and agrees that during the term of this Agreement, the Chief Academic Innovations Officer may be engaged as a consultant, by one or more other institutions, so long as such engagement does not interfere with the duties and responsibilities of the Chief Academic Officer; and does not conflict, or compete, with the

interests of Elite Academic Academy - Lucerne. All consulting agreements must be pre approved by the CEO.

This offer of employment is subject to the laws of the State of California and Rules and Regulations of the State Board of Education and the Governing Board of the Charter. The terms and conditions set forth herein may be changed at any time by mutual consent of the contracting parties. In the event that ADA declines or projections are not met after P1/P2 certification, resulting in a declining ending fund balance, the CEO reserves the right to re-negotiate and adjust the financial terms of the contract within 30 days of a written notice. The CEO reserves the right to make any assignment that your credential authorizes and to change that assignment at its discretion. The above salary rate is subject to review (upward or downward) of official transcripts and if verified experience does not agree with the unofficial information supplied in your application.

SPEAKER ENGAGEMENT AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein contained, the Parties agree as follows:

- 4. <u>Relationships of the Parties</u>. The Speaker is an independent contractor and not an employee of the Company. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create a joint venture, partnership, or employment relationship between the Parties. The Speaker shall not represent to any third party that he has the authority to bind the Company in any way. The Speaker is solely responsible for any taxes due on the honorarium.
- 5. <u>Confidentiality</u>. The Speaker acknowledges that during the term of this Agreement, he may have access to or receive confidential and proprietary information belonging to the Company. The Speaker agrees not to disclose or use any such information except as required to perform the speaking engagement under this Agreement. The Speaker retains ownership of his original curriculum, proprietary resources, and educational content created prior to this engagement.
 - 6. Work Product. Any materials specifically created for the Event by the Speaker

(such as presentation slides or handouts) shall remain the property of the Speaker, unless otherwise agreed in writing. The Company retains no ownership of such materials beyond their use in the Event.

- 7. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement shall terminate upon completion of the speaking engagement at the Event on June 24, 2025. Either Party may terminate this Agreement at any time prior to the Event by providing written notice to the other Party. In the event of such termination, no compensation shall be due, unless the Speaker has already delivered services.
- 8. <u>Choice of Law and Venue</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any disputes shall be resolved in the Superior Court for the State of California in Los Angeles.
- 9. <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the Parties and supersedes all prior discussions and agreements, whether written or oral.
- 10. <u>Amendments.</u> No modification or waiver of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and signed by both Parties.
- 11. <u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this Agreement is found to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect.
- 12. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, including electronically transmitted copies, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which together shall constitute one and the same agreement.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made, effective as of July 1st, 2025 to August 3rd, 2025, between Justin Shaw ("Contractor") and Elite Academic Academy - Lucerne ("Company" or "EAAL") (individually a "Party" and collectively the "Parties").

WHEREAS Company desires to retain the services of the Contractor, and the Contractor desires to provide services to Company.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and agreement hereinafter set forth the sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

1. <u>Engagement</u>. Company hereby retains Contractor to serve as the Company's PEAK PERFORMANCE Temporary Athletic Training Assistant. Specifically, Contractor agrees to perform the following duties, associated with this position, for Company; and such other services as Company may from time to time request:

General Duties:

- provide athletic testing preparation drills virtually and in-person for participating teams
- attend planning meetings for Peak Performance Stadium Event to prepare for role as event emcee
- act as event emcee for standardized athletic training and main program
- 2. <u>Engagement</u>. Company hereby retains Contractor to, and Contractor agrees to perform the above duties, associated with this position, for Company, and such other services as Company may from time to time request.
- 3. <u>Commissions</u>. Company will pay Contractor a total compensation of \$45.63 per hour for 20 hours per week for Contractor's duties as PEAK PERFORMANCE Temporary Athletic Training Assistant. Contractor will send the company an invoice biweekly after services are rendered. Once approved, it will be processed and paid to the contractor within 15 business days.
- 4. <u>Regulatory Compliance</u>. If the Contractor is working with students, or in the office where students may reside, they must at all times comply with all laws regarding qualifications to work with or around students including, without limitation, state and federal fingerprint clearance (Live Scan) (Cal. Ed. Code § 44237) proof of clear TB test within 60 days of the Effective Date, as defined hereinbelow and updated every 4 years; and, valid state driver's license.
- 5. <u>Expenses</u>. The Contractor will be responsible for bearing his own costs and expenses unless agreed to in advance by the Company and the Contractor provides proper documentation for the expense.

- 6. <u>Acknowledgments</u>. The contractor acknowledges and understands that he/she is an independent contractor and that he/she is not forming a traditional employer-employee relationship with the Company. The contractor is not entitled to participate in any plans, arrangements, or distributions pertaining to or connected with any compensation plan, health, dental, life, or disability insurance programs, or any other fringe benefits which Company, from time to time, may provide for its owners and/or employees if any. The Contractor shall be solely responsible for all costs incurred for health, dental, and/or life insurance on his behalf. The contractor shall be solely responsible for making all federal, state, and local tax deposits relating to compensation received as a result of his relationship with the Company and shall hold the Company harmless from and against any and all tax liability relating thereto. The contractor further agrees he is solely responsible for workers' compensation insurance for himself and any subcontractors she may hire, if any, and agrees to indemnify and hold the Company harmless for any workers' compensation claim of loss or damage arising in connection with the Contractor's performance of services under this Agreement.
- 7. <u>Term.</u> The contractor's engagement shall be effective July 1st, 2025 (the "Effective Date") and shall continue until August 3rd, 2025, including any necessary wrap-up tasks, unless the engagement is terminated by either Party prior to this date. To the extent the Contractor wishes to terminate this Agreement he must provide the Company with thirty (30) days advance written notice. The Company may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without notice. Additionally, this Agreement shall terminate in the event of Contractor's death, inability to continue to provide services as described in this Agreement, or breach of any provision of this Agreement.
- 8. <u>Modification of this Agreement</u>. No waiver or modification of this Agreement, in whole or in part, will be valid unless it is made in writing and duly executed by the Parties. Any waiver of any term, condition, or provision of this Agreement will not constitute a waiver of any other term, condition, or provision hereof, nor will a waiver or any breach of any term, condition, or provision constitute a waiver of any subsequent or succeeding breach.
- 9. <u>Assignment</u>. This Agreement, the services to be performed, and all rights hereunder are personal to the Contractor and may not be transferred or assigned by the Contractor at any time. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Company's successors and assigns. In the event of Contractor's death, inability to perform his duties, or his breach of this Agreement, Company shall have no further obligations hereunder other than to pay him or his estate any fees or expenses that are payable hereunder which are accrued and unpaid as of the date of either his death, disability, or breach.
- 10. <u>Confidentiality.</u> Contractor acknowledges that Company is in a highly competitive industry and that during the term of this Agreement, Contractor will have access to, receive, learn, and/or develop information that is proprietary, trade secrets, and/or confidential to the Company, including, but not limited to information about customers, prospects, financials, and marketing. Additionally, the Contractor will have access to and maintain, develop and initiate customer relationships and goodwill that are of value to the Company and which it has a legitimate interest in protecting.

At all times during and after the term of Contractor's engagement with Company,

Contractor shall not, except with Company's prior written consent, or except in the proper course of his performance of services for the Company, directly or indirectly, disclose, communicate, or divulge to any individual or entity, or use for his own benefit or the benefit of any other individual or entity, any confidential or proprietary knowledge or information concerning the conduct or details of Company's business, including without limitation, names of customers and prospects, details of contracts, technical know-how, methods of operation, marketing methods, other trade secrets, pricing, or other policies, prospects, and financial information. The contractor acknowledges that these provisions apply even to information that is developed or conceived by him alone or with others at the Company's direction, as well as to confidential and/or proprietary information received from any customer or other person or entity who does business with the Company; however, the Contractor will be retain the ownership of his original curriculum, proprietary resources, and Educational content created prior to the contract with the Company.

Upon termination of Contractor's engagement with Company for any reason, Contractor shall immediately return to Company all correspondence, files, customer and prospect lists, notes, technical data, and other materials that contain any such confidential or proprietary knowledge or information, and Contractor shall not retain any copies of such materials. A violation of this paragraph shall be considered a material breach of this Agreement.

- 11. <u>Work Product.</u> The product of all work performed under this Agreement ("Work Product"), including without limitation all notes, reports, documentation, drawings, computer programs, inventions, creations, works, devices, models, work-in-progress, and deliverables that are conceived, made, reduced to practice, or learned by Contractor, solely or in conjunction with others, in the course of any work performed for the Company, will be the sole property of the Company, and Contractor hereby assigns to the Company all right, title and interest therein, including but not limited to all audiovisual, literary, moral rights and other copyrights, patent rights, trade secret rights, and other proprietary rights therein. The contractor retains no right to use the Work Product and agrees not to challenge the validity of the Client's ownership of the Work Product.
- 12. <u>Choice of Law and Forum.</u> This Agreement and the performance of services hereunder will be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any lawsuit filed by either Contractor or Company shall be filed in the Superior Court for the State of California in Los Angeles. The contractor and Company herein each consent to the personal jurisdiction and venue of said court over them and agree not to contest jurisdiction or the application of California law.
- 13. <u>Attorneys' Fees</u>. The Contractor agrees to indemnify the Company for its reasonable attorneys' fees and costs incurred in enforcing the terms of this Agreement should the Contractor violate any of its terms.
- 14. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the complete agreement of the Parties and will supersede any and all other agreements, understandings, and representations, whether oral or written, by and between the Parties hereto.
- 15. <u>Relationship of the Parties</u>. The Contractor is an independent contractor, not a Company employee. This Agreement does not constitute a joint venture, partnership, merger, acquisition, or employment relationship. The contractor does not have any authority to bind the Company or

enter into any contract on the Company's behalf (with the exception of routine purchase orders). The contractor is solely responsible for its debts, liabilities, and obligations, including obligations for income or other taxes, and the Contractor shall hold Company harmless for the same. The contractor shall prepare and file all tax returns required under applicable law. The contractor shall not incur any expense on behalf of the Company, shall not enter into any contract or agreement on behalf of the Company without prior written consent from Company, and shall not represent to any other person or entity that the Contractor is authorized to enter into any contract or agreement on behalf of Company or bind Company in any way unless she has prior written consent. Nothing herein requires the Company to offer services and work opportunities to the Contractor, and nothing herein requires the Contractor to accept work opportunities. Nothing herein requires the Contractor to work exclusively for the Company. The contractor may not hire any employees or engage any Contractor to assist in the performance of his duties hereunder, without the prior written consent of an Owner of the Company. The contractor shall fully indemnify and hold Company completely harmless for any and all expenses, costs, liabilities, and losses, including attorneys' fees, as a result of the Contractor's violation of any provision of this paragraph.

- 16. <u>Severability</u>: If any provision of this Agreement is construed to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, then the remaining provisions hereof shall not be affected thereby and shall be enforceable without regard thereto.
- 17. <u>Binding Authority</u>: The Company and its representative signing this Agreement agree and confirm that the undersigned individual has the right, power, and authority to sign this Agreement on behalf of the Company and to legally bind the Company to this Agreement with his signature.
- 18. <u>Counterparts</u>: This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which will be deemed to be an original copy of this Agreement, and all of which, when taken together, will be deemed to constitute one and the same agreement. The exchange of copies of this Agreement and of signature pages by facsimile or electronic transmission shall constitute effective execution and delivery of this Agreement as to the Parties and may be used in lieu of the original Agreement for all purposes. Signatures of the Parties transmitted by facsimile or email shall be deemed to be their original signatures for all purposes.

The undersigned, on behalf of Elite Academic Academy – Lucerne, a California nonprofit public benefit corporation (the "Company"), hereby certifies that the resolutions set forth below were adopted by the Board of Directors (the "Board") of the Company, in accordance with Section 5211(a) of the California Nonprofit Corporation Law and Article VI of the Bylaws, at a duly noticed meeting held on June 12, 2025, Pacific Time. A quorum of the Board was present at the meeting.

WHEREAS, Elite Academic Academy – Lucerne implemented a fiscally conservative budget during the 2024–2025 school year due to the State of California's projected deficits, deferrals, and uncertainty in funding for non-classroom-based public schools; and

WHEREAS, during this period, certificated and classified staff undertook duties and responsibilities significantly beyond their regular scope of work, including accepting additional student riders, maintaining elevated caseloads, and personalizing learning at scale without increasing staffing costs; and

WHEREAS. this collective effort contributed to:

- Reduced operational expenditures,
- Increased student retention,
- Attendance rates surpassing the school's 95% projection, and
- Enhanced student outcomes and overall school performance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The Board of Directors hereby approves a **one-time**, **off-schedule salary increase** for the 2024–2025 school year for all employees who:
 - Were employed by the school for at least 90% of the academic year, and
 - Remained employed through the final contractual workday of the year.
- 2. This off-schedule payment shall be a **fixed**, **equal amount** for all qualifying employees and is provided as a **compensatory adjustment** for services rendered during a period of financial uncertainty and exceptional staff performance.
- 3. The **exact amount** of the one-time, off-schedule increase shall be determined by the **Business Department** during the year-end financial closeout process based on available funding, and shall fall within a **range of \$5,000 to \$7,000** per qualifying employee.
- 4. This is a **non-recurring**, **off-schedule adjustment** and shall not be added to any employee's base salary or used to calculate future salary expectations.

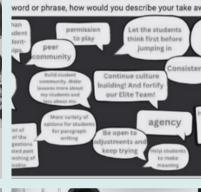

OUR WORK

What an extraordinary journey we've been on together! In 2024–2025, we celebrated as dozens of teachers across Elite Academic transformed their practice through the Fellowship and JumpStart programs. These educators are now confidently facilitating learning environments where students construct meaning, ask profound questions, and synthesize knowledge across disciplines. As Barbara Craig from Fellows Round 2 explains, "Flipping I Do, We Do, You Do around which allows students to struggle, fail, discover, encourage, collaborate and explore concepts (not just content). Self discovery is more powerful and has longevity in retaining concepts, so I am helping to facilitate this."

This transformation reflects a fundamental shift: when educators are empowered with sustained, personalized coaching, they create learning environments that cultivate curiosity, critical thinking, collaboration, communication, creativity, and compassion—the very competencies students need to thrive in an Altransformed world.

This groundswell of transformation naturally leads us to our next exciting chapter. With so many teachers now fluent in reducing their "teacher footprint" while increasing student agency, it's time to weave these approaches into the very fabric of Elite Academic.

As Monique Waithe, Director of Flex Academy, observed during our strategic planning sessions, "As an organization, Elite^x still feels separate as opposed to being integrated into core identity." Just as our Fellows invested 2–3 hours weekly for a year to internalize new practices, academy directors need their own journey of experiential learning. Through this 8-week intensive, leaders will personally experience the same transformative process their teachers have undergone, developing the coaching skills to guide their teams with authentic understanding.

Simultaneously, we're launching **Integration Teams** based on a key insight from change management: transformation requires ongoing purpose, support, and engagement—not one-and-done training. These teams offer every Elite^X alum a pathway to continue their growth while contributing to systemic change. By channeling individual passions—whether for coaching, parent education, Al integration, or building professional development—into collaborative action, these teams will weave Elite^X practices into daily operations across all academies. This is how sustainable change happens: through communities of practice working within their areas of passion and expertise.

And yes, we'll continue growing our community! New JumpStart cohorts will welcome fresh teachers into our culture, while Fellows 3.0 will deepen the practice of those ready for the next level. But now, these programs won't exist in isolation—they'll be supported by trained internal coaches, integrated systems, and aligned leadership.

The evidence is compelling: schools that create conditions for sustained professional growth, align resources strategically, and engage families as partners see remarkable results. Students don't just improve academically—they develop the adaptive expertise and human capabilities that no Al can replicate.

The momentum is undeniable. The community is ready. Thank you for continuing to partner with us as we empower and build the future of Elite Academic together.

Fellows 3.0 marks a pivotal shift in how we build coaching capacity. The Coach-the-Coach Integration Team members, having understood coaching foundations through intensive work with Anna in Sept - Dec, will now serve as assistant coaches for Fellows 3.0 participants.

Each new Fellow will receive coaching from these trained assistant coaches (in addition to 1:1 time with Anna) who will record their sessions and receive weekly feedback from Anna in small group sessions. This creates a powerful multiplier effect: as our coaches develop their skills with real Fellows, they're simultaneously building the internal capacity that will make Elite^x sustainable for years to come.

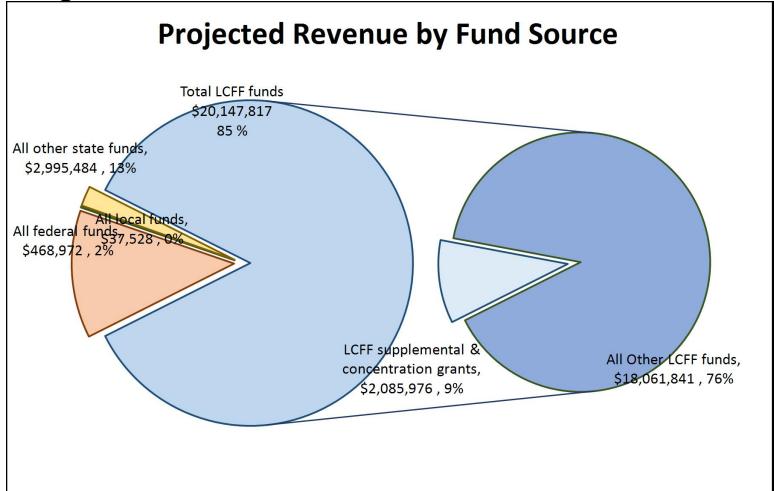

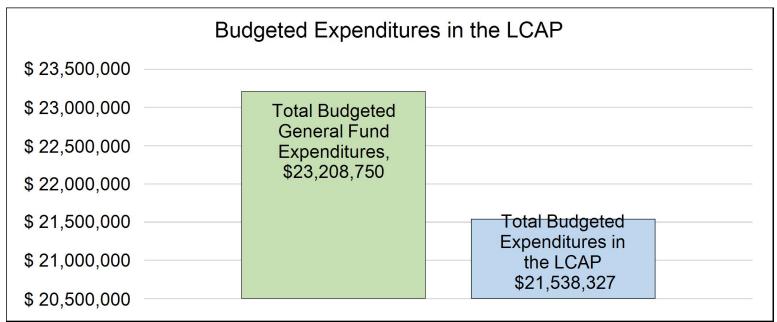

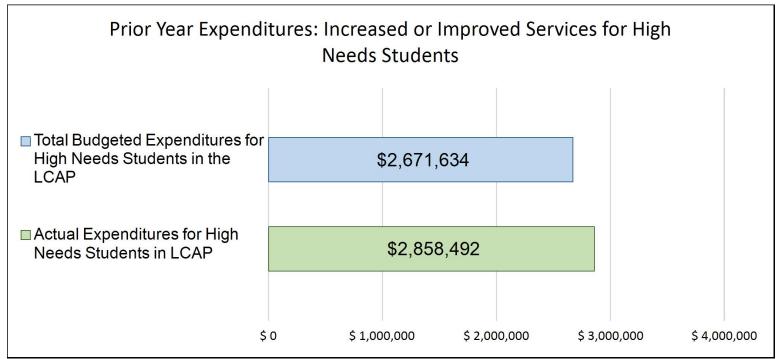

Our advancement in English Language Arts (ELA) is evidenced by growth in both i-Ready and CAASPP scores. Mid-year i-Ready results showed 42% of students reading at or above grade level, and 46% of students met or exceeded standards on the CAASPP ELA assessment—demonstrating the efficacy of our pedagogical approaches and targeted supports.

In Mathematics, we observed moderate growth, with 29% of students meeting or exceeding standards on the CAASPP—an increase from the previous year. Tools like ParentSquare and internal surveys have enhanced two-way communication and provided valuable insights into school climate and family needs. Ensuring student and staff safety remains a top priority. Through comprehensive protocols, including fingerprinting, mandatory training, and the use of digital monitoring tools, we have maintained a safe and supportive learning environment.

Support for English Language Learners has also been a focus area, with targeted interventions and advisory sessions helping students make steady progress in English proficiency.

Our renewed commitment to digital engagement through social media and website updates has improved communication and transparency, ensuring families are well-informed and connected to school life.

Overall, the actions taken this year have laid a strong foundation for sustained progress. We are encouraged by the momentum gained and remain committed to building on these successes in the years to come.

In the previous year, our commitment to the Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) remained strong, with focused efforts on maximizing the impact of our MTSS Grant funds. Targeted professional development equipped staff with effective strategies to implement MTSS practices, supporting the diverse academic and social-emotional needs of our students—particularly in the face of persistent learning gaps and increased mental health challenges among incoming students.

A key area of growth this year was the expansion of direct services to English Learners. We provided more intentional, targeted supports designed to accelerate English language acquisition, with interventions embedded within both designated and integrated instructional settings. These efforts allowed ELL students to engage more meaningfully with grade-level content while also developing their English proficiency.

Additionally, we made strategic improvements in aligning Tier 2 interventions with the core curriculum. Our Learning Labs were refined to more closely mirror the concepts and strategies being taught in students' primary academic programs, ensuring consistency and coherence in instructional approaches. This enhanced alignment has improved students' ability to apply intervention-based learning directly within their core coursework, increasing overall academic impact.

While the overall direction of our MTSS implementation stayed true to our original plan, some adjustments were necessary to meet the unique needs of our non-classroom-based student population. Tiered interventions were refined for greater effectiveness, and a new referral

request system allowed us to more efficiently identify and serve students needing additional support. The use of the MTSS Instructional Coach platform provided more targeted interventions in ELA and Math for students performing below proficiency, improving the precision of our support.

Finally, the continued success of our extended school year through the Credit Recovery/Acceleration Year-Round track reflected our ongoing commitment to academic equity. This initiative provided at-risk students with vital opportunities to stay on track for graduation, reinforcing our broader mission of supporting all learners through flexible and responsive educational practices.

Given the small and highly transient nature of our English Learner (EL) population, measuring progress based solely on EL reclassification rates is not a reliable indicator of the effectiveness of our actions. The number and composition of EL students fluctuate significantly each year, making it difficult to track long-term trends using reclassification data alone.

Instead, we rely on iReady assessment data to gauge the progress of our current EL students. By comparing Beginning-of-Year (BOY) and Middle-of-Year (MOY) results, we are able to monitor growth in key areas such as reading and mathematics. This approach allows us to make timely instructional adjustments and provide targeted supports based on real-time student performance.

This shift in focus has proven effective in giving us a more accurate and responsive picture of how well our interventions are supporting English Learners, particularly within the context of our flexible and non-traditional school model.

We are proud to share continued progress on the implementation of Goal 4. Our focus on building robust Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways across high school and middle school has steadily advanced, supporting students from grades K–14 as they explore careers, develop industry-aligned skills, and prepare for both college and the workforce.

CTE pathway options have expanded significantly, with new programs including Esports, Marketing, Professional Music Production, Medical Pathways, and Product Design. These offerings have generated strong engagement from students and families alike. Additionally, the introduction of Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs) such as HOSA and DECA—where we are proud to be the first non-classroom-based school approved—has deepened student involvement and leadership development in their areas of interest.

We are especially excited to share that this year we celebrated our first cohort of CTE pathway completers, marking a major milestone in our program's growth and effectiveness.

To ensure alignment with postsecondary expectations, CTE and core academic courses continue to be developed to meet state standards and UC/CSU A-G requirements. This alignment ensures students can earn transferable credits while gaining relevant knowledge and experience.

In support of college and career readiness, we continue to expand efforts to improve FAFSA completion rates. Our school counselors have led this charge by facilitating parent/student workshops and embedding financial aid education into Government and Economics courses. This work ensures students are better informed and more prepared to access postsecondary opportunities.

Overall, our CTE programs are thriving, with increasing student interest, improved alignment with college and career standards, and continued innovation that reflects our commitment to preparing students for success beyond high school.

Integrating FAFSA completion into the Economics course as a graded

assignment has shown moderate success, but we recognize that additional strategies are needed to ensure higher participation and deeper understanding.

In parallel, the development of a credit recovery track within our virtual high school has positively contributed to our progress on the CA College and Career Readiness Dashboard. This targeted intervention has helped us better identify students who can benefit from additional A-G course enrollments. By tailoring support and expanding access to college-preparatory coursework, we are working toward improving both academic outcomes and long-term readiness for college and careers.

Closing the achievement gap and improving student outcomes are central to Elite Academic Academy's mission. We are dedicated to ensuring that all students, including English learners (EL), foster youth (FY), and low-income (LI) students, graduate high school ready for college and career. To achieve this, Elite Academic Academy has implemented strategic investments, curriculum enhancements, and instructional support tailored to meet the needs of these student subgroups.

We have been focused on establishing connections and partnerships with families, community partners, and all stakeholders to increase engagement, and involvement, and ensure safety and satisfaction to support student learning and achievement. (All Students include EL, FY, LI) Elite Academic Academy has budgeted a commensurate increase in funding to reach these subgroups that are principally directed and effective in meeting school-wide goals; specifically, the school provided:

- Adaptive online/traditional content from a variety of curriculum options This is a multi-year project which focused on expanding course offerings each year.
- College & Career Readiness courses/curriculum from A-G Curriculum providers or Elite's own adopted A-G course catalog
- Increased access to technology equipment to support unduplicated pupils
- Added additional courses to engage students with various interests so that they stay committed to their academic experience.
- Implemented two benchmark assessment programs; one that can be administered online and one offline. This gives teachers the flexibility to assess students in a format that works best for the student. We also provided professional development on the use of programs and data interpretations from these two systems.
- Created project-based learning opportunities for additional hands-on learning. It is critical that connections be made between what a student is learning and what they experience. These experiences make learning more relevant.
- Implemented a comprehensive curriculum for EL learners, including two support courses for our EL students
- Increased Learning Lab tutoring and intensive intervention support for unduplicated pupils who are struggling, in an effort to close
 the achievement gap. Our Learning Lab/tutoring sessions give students another opportunity to build relationships and connect with
 a supportive adult. Not only do the Learning Lab coaches teach specific skills, but they also monitor progress, collaborate with

To track progress in implementing the state academic standards, Elite Academic Academy uses a combination of digital tools, internal assessments, and professional learning systems. For English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics, we utilize iReady and iXL to monitor student progress and inform instruction. For English Language Development (ELD), we use ELPAC practice exams to ensure alignment with state expectations. Across all other content areas—including Science, History-Social Science, Career Technical Education (CTE), Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA), and others—we rely on internally developed course assessments that are regularly analyzed during Professional Learning Community (PLC) data dives.

In addition, our EliteX professional development fellowship provides structured opportunities for instructional growth. As part of this program, teachers submit recorded lessons which are reviewed and calibrated using our "Teaching with Intention" Guide. This process ensures consistent implementation of rigorous and relevant standards-based instruction.

We selected these tools because they align with our instructional model, support personalized learning, and offer reliable data that informs real-time instruction. iReady and iXL provide actionable diagnostic information, while our internal assessments are tailored to the specific curriculum our students engage with. The EliteX program fosters ongoing teacher development and ensures curriculum delivery is standards-based and meaningful.

Based on these measures, Elite Academic Academy is demonstrating successful implementation of all state academic standards. CTE pathways continue to expand annually, as does participation in our VAPA program. Our data-driven instructional approach, supported by strong professional learning systems, positions us for continued growth and excellence across all content areas.

New staff also participate in both in-person and virtual professional development sessions that emphasize relationship-building as a core value of our school. Similarly, we have created a highly personalized onboarding experience for our families. We also host LCAP input sessions, Family Empowerment workshops, Parent Academy events, and ELPAC meetings. Translators are readily available to ensure all families can participate fully in our community.

We provide ongoing resources that promote relationship-building, including webinars and guidance for both staff and families focused on student development and effective communication. Our Student Support Team remains a critical partner, offering workshops, training, and support services year-round.

Whether through a virtual check-in, a field trip, or a family workshop, we prioritize consistent and authentic connection. From initial contact to everyday interactions, we are intentional about creating a welcoming environment where every student and family feels seen, heard, and supported.

At Elite, we believe that student success is best achieved through intentional collaboration among educators, families, and educational partners. Our efforts are guided by a shared commitment to high expectations, clear communication, and data-informed practices that directly support student achievement.

Shared Vision for Student Success

Our administrators and staff have collaboratively defined what it means to be an exemplary Elite graduate. This shared vision has shaped schoolwide expectations and learning goals, grounded in student-centered outcomes. Together, we've developed clear criteria for student success and aligned our practices to support measurable growth. We use a comprehensive set of internal and external tools—including CAASPP, iReady, IXL, and Fast ForWord—to track academic progress and adjust instruction based on real-time data.

Strengthening Communication and Collaboration

We maintain strong internal partnerships through consistent and multi-layered communication. Weekly and bi-weekly staff meetings, regular in-person gatherings, and ongoing check-ins with Academy Directors provide structured opportunities for collaboration and support. We leverage digital tools like ParentSquare, Google Workspace for Education, and other platforms to streamline communication and planning. Our professional development program, aligned with schoolwide goals, focuses on analyzing student work, increasing engagement, and using data to inform instruction. These sessions empower teachers to make targeted decisions that directly benefit students.

We've built strong relationships with educational vendors and organizations whose tools and values align with our mission. Programs like Fast ForWord and iReady are helping us close literacy and math gaps, particularly for English Learners and at-risk students. Families

We maintain open, accessible communication channels for families to engage with teachers and school leadership. These include email, our school website, social media, and the Parent-Square app. Families are encouraged to participate in LCAP meetings and Parent Workshops, where they can provide valuable input on school goals,

At Elite Academic Academy, we collect data through multiple mini-surveys administered at the end of each learning period. These surveys are designed to gauge student, parent, and staff satisfaction across various aspects of the educational experience. Below are the results from the most recent surveys:

Satisfied with communication and responsiveness: 99.3%

Satisfied with opportunities such as field trips and extracurriculars: 88.2%

Throughout the year, we focused on monitoring student wellness, school climate, and connection. The Student Support Team distributed Elite Cares Surveys to all student stakeholders to measure student engagement and feelings of connection. Each survey response was followed up with direct communication from the teacher, MTSS Director, or school counselor based on student needs.

These surveys provided valuable insights that guided several changes. For example, students expressed feelings of loneliness and boredom, which led to the creation of more clubs and enrichment opportunities, including a Student Leadership Club. Additionally, we identified that some students felt disconnected from their teachers or the school, prompting outreach from our Support Team, resulting in students feeling valued and seeing improvements in their academic progress.

From the surveys, we also gathered data on student progress:

59% of middle and high school students were on track with their work

30% were a little behind but receiving support

11% needed additional help

In direct response to these results, we offer a virtual study hall for students to receive academic support and connect with their teachers. This initiative addressed the concerns raised by students about needing more academic guidance and connection with their teachers.

School Climate and Communication: While students and families reported high satisfaction with communication, particularly regarding family-school interactions, there is still room to increase engagement in school activities and further improve school climate.

Areas of Strength:

Diverse Educational Offerings: One of our key strengths is the variety of state-approved curricula available at Elite Academic Academy, ensuring students have access to UC/A-G courses, CTE pathways, and high school diploma tracks. Our ability to document personalized learning choices reflects our commitment to individualized education.

Personalized Approach to Education: Our use of student interest surveys and incorporating student feedback in course creation allows us to tailor education to individual needs, fostering a more relevant and engaging academic experience.

Areas for Improvement:

Expansion of Career Technical Education (CTE) Pathways: We are actively expanding our CTE offerings, providing a wider range of pathways to better equip students with practical skills and career opportunities. This is an ongoing effort to strengthen and align our programs with student needs and workforce demands.

Broaden English Learner (EL) Curriculum: We are enhancing our EL curriculum from TK-12 to ensure comprehensive support for our diverse student population. This aligns with our goal of providing equitable educational opportunities for all students and continues to be a key area of focus.

Increase VAPA and Physical Fitness Options: We are adding more Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) and Physical Fitness offerings to ensure a well-rounded, holistic education for our students. These additions complement our core academic curriculum and are aligned with our mission to support all aspects of student development.

Support for Student Wellness: In addition to academic and extracurricular expansions, we have introduced more group counseling programs focused on growth mindset, anxiety, and grief. These programs aim to support students' emotional well-being, further aligning our offerings with the needs of our school community.

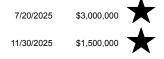

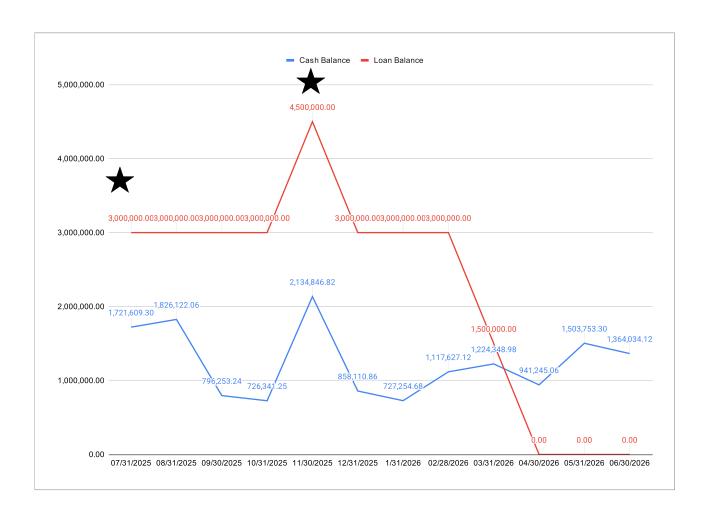
